### Message from the Deputy Headmaster

We were thrilled to have a new member of our community assisting our staff this week with some modern day issues. Mr Thabang Moleko is in fact a new part of the Graeme College family. He is helping staff work through a number of issues that occur in the workplace and will be having a few more contact sessions with us. On Tuesday we had our first meeting where various complex scenarios were mentioned by the staff, and Mr Moleko gave some stunning advice and feedback. Mr Moleko is currently a lecturer in the Rhodes Business School. He has a Bachelor of Commerce degree from Rhodes University and has also obtained his Master's in Business Administration from Nelson Mandela Business School. He has vast experience in the corporate world in dealing with a wide variety of scenarios and he is also the recipient of the Mandela Washington Fellowship which allowed him to train in public management at Morgan State University in Baltimore, USA. Mr. Moleko is pursuing his Phd in Business Management at Rhodes University and we are thrilled to continue our great relationship with the Business School and with Rhodes University in general.

## The 2nd hand clothing shop



Results: 1st XI vs St Andrews St Andrews 232/7 declared Graeme 179/7 declared Match drawn

It was just incredible to be part of inter-school cricket fixtures again. This might sound ridiculous, but the excitement on the face while talking to a 1st XI player on Saturday just seemed so far out of place. It was the type of excitement you see on Christmas morning - I think we underestimate how much these boys miss their sport. That excitement was such a blessing with regards to the actual results - the boys weren't caught up in the pressure of results in a derby fixture. They allowed them to play with freedom, and they were brilliant.

Playing our first match of the year against St Andrews on Lower, isn't an easy task by any stretch of the imagination. And what a great venue to play on any day, but even more special to hand over 1st XI caps to Ethan Beyleveld and Onosizo Ntinga in their debut matches for the college at our highest level. In fact, both went on to play significant roles within the game which is exactly what we expect from any youngster representing the college. All our teams played in a longer format, with a second innings of 5 wickets.

Graeme lost the toss in the 1st XI game, and St Andrews decided to bat with no hesitation. Graeme struck first though, and St Andrews were under early pressure at 2-2. Good partnerships through the morning saw a see-saw battle ensuing between the two teams. St Andrews showed their great experience, and never seemed to get flustered. Graeme though managed to get crucial breakthroughs after each break in pay. The period just before lunch and after lunch had vastly different outcomes. Graeme took the new ball just before lunch and struck three times leaving St Andrews on 187/7 at the break. After lunch, Graeme's experience cost them badly as St Andrews raced to 232/7 declared. Aphiwe Mnyanda (3) and Onosiso Ntinga (2) were the main wicket takers and bowled superbly well.

Graeme were quite superb in their reply against a fine bowling attack. After losing an early wicket Liselihle Maphekula and Aphiwe Mnyanda batted superbly under pressure. The St Andrews bowlers gave them nothing, and the batsmen kept their cool despite struggling to score freely. Graeme got to tea at 52/1, but lost Maphekula just as he seemed to express himself with freedom. Losing Mnyanda was a big blow soon thereafter but Mornay Kohl (42) provided a superb captain's performance. He joined with Fabio Rischbieter (46) in a fantastic partnership. Both got out with a few overs remaining in the day, but Graeme had done enough to secure a solid draw on the day. At the close of play Graeme were 179/7. It was an impressive start for our young 1st XI.

Please use your sons name and surname as the reference. Unfortunately, we are unable to credit your account if there is no reference to your son. We receive far too many references as "Graeme College, GJG, School Fees, etc".

Kindly remember, there are 650 learners in the school and without the correct reference, it's impossible to allocate the fees to the correct account!

### Traffic control

For easy movement of traffic, please adhere to the following:

- 1) Only Foundation Phase boys (Grade 1, 2 & 3) may be dropped or collected from the front of the school. This must take place at the "circle" and not in front of the main entrance to the school building.
- 2) Between the times of 07h15 and 07h45, please use the main school gate as an entry ONLY and please exit the campus via the Grant House (boarding establishment) gate i.e. one way.
- 3) Boys in Grades 4 to 12 must be dropped off and collected at the Graemian Centre car park or at the Selborne or swimming pool gates i.e. at the back of the school.

Please adhere to a speed limit of 20km/hour on the school roads and be a responsible road user.

This year the hostel boys are challenging day boys to also make ecobricks.

What you will need to make an eco brick:

- 1. 2 liter plastic cooldrink bottle with a lid
- 2. A stick or dowel rod at least 45 cm long to press the plastic into the bottle
- 3. Any plastic bags, cling wrap, chip packets, cling wrap, foil cereal packets (eg Future life packets)

Your eco-brick must be packed tightly, the firmer the better. It must weigh at least 500g.














DR. LAUREN SHAW INTERVIEWED BY STUDENT ZIMI SISHUTA
