### Message from the Deputy Headmaster

With the expected announcement on Sunday night, there are so many different emotions associated with our combined responses to the move to Level 4. Initially there is a level of frustration - that we don't seem to get it right with regards to social distancing and covid protocols. I read a meme this morning that said:

"Be like Darth Vader...

Wear your mask!

Don't visit your son or daughter.

Be socially and emotionally distant.

Follow instructions."

Others have suggested that, if we can learn to walk in 12 months, and possibly even learn to talk in 18 months... surely we can learn how and when to wear a mask.

There are also other subsequent emotions that eventually settle in, once you understand the gravity of the impact that this has for many people. In our town, small businesses have had to deal with the original lock-down, then a forced

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closure due to strike action and now even more economic restrictions as we return to Level 4. In many cases the impact on small businesses is devastating. As individuals, we possibly have even less money now to help, but where we can, we need to support our community; especially those local businesses. There are so many families that have been hit hard, financially, because of the consequences that Covid has had on our community. We need to help somehow; and that reminds me of the old parable of the 'long spoons':

"An old woman is nearing the end of her life. As she closes her eyes one night, she sees a bright light and is transported to another realm. She doesn't pass away just then, instead, she returns to the living world to find her family gathered at her bedside. She smiles and whispers to her children, "I have seen the great hereafter. Heaven and hell. I have seen them both." The old woman goes on to explain, "I came upon a door, and behind it was hell. What I saw there confounded me. There was a dining hall filled with rows of tables, each table teaming with a magnificent feast. It looked and smelled delicious, yet the people seated around the tables were emaciated and sickly, moaning with hunger. "As I came closer, I realized that each person held a very long spoon. With it they could reach the feast, but the spoon was too long. Though they tried and tried again, they couldn't bring nourishment to their mouth. In spite of the abundance before them, they were starving." She continued, "I left this horrid place and opened a new door, one that led to heaven. Inside, I was surprised to see that very same scene before my eyes, a dining hall filled with row upon row of tables, and on those tables, a marvelous feast. But instead of moaning with hunger, the people around the tables were sitting contentedly, talking with one another, sated from the abundance before them. "Like those in hell, these people were holding very long spoons. As I watched, a woman dipped her spoon into a bowl of stew before her, but rather than struggling to feed herself, she extended her spoon out and fed the man seated across from her. This person, now satisfied and no longer hungry, gave thanks and returned the favor, leaning across the table to feed the woman." "I suddenly understood the difference between heaven and hell," the old woman said to her family. "It is neither the qualities of the place, nor of the abundance of resources, but the way people treat each other. "In hell, we are selfish. We would rather go hungry than give the people we don't care for the pleasure of eating." "But in heaven, we feed each other. We put trust in those around us, and never go hungry."

This is the time to support and look after our community. We need to 'feed each other', and just look after each other. It is so easy to be selfish in this space, because we focus on our own safety and well-being. Where you can, try to do a little extra for our community during the third wave. Support local shops and restaurants; order takeaway meals when you can, and just be mindful of those that have either lost their jobs or rely on customers to keep their business afloat. There are so many dimensions to the socio-economic impact of the pandemic. So please, wherever you can, do a little extra for the person next to you - and they will do the same for others. Due to the extreme disparity that we see in South Africa, with regards to wealth and standard of living - sometimes we forget what kind of impact this is having on all the people in our community.

#### Closure of Schools:

With our holiday being brought forward by a week because of the impact of the third wave, we will wait and see what further implications that this has for us. As it stands now, the length of the holiday period remains the same, and schools are scheduled to open on 19 July. That means no extra teaching time is lost, although we are always playing catchup this year. The forced closure of schools during the recent strikes have obviously not helped either. We will stay in contact, with regards to any further communication from the department of education.

We were thrilled that we were able to complete exams in Grade 10, 11 and 12 before we closed. There were one or two Grade 8 and 9 exams that will be completed in Term 3. The Junior school also managed to complete their assessment programme, and are handing out reports today. We will also be compiling Grade 12 reports which will be available during the holiday for collection.

It is exciting to see the installation of a sprinkler system on the Marais Fields, yet another project initiated by the proceeds from the Elephant Cup Invitational Golf Day.



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### Music

Grade 4 and Grade 5 Instruments of the Orchestra Bingo Competition

One of the themes in music class this term was learning about the philharmonic orchestra. The boys learnt about every instrument in the orchestra and had to identify each instrument according to appearance and solo or ensemble sound clips. The grade 4 and 5 classes competed against each-other in three speed rounds based on the Bingo game structure to see which class could collect the most points for correctly identifying instruments from sound clips. Of course, quicker responses directly related to the collection of points per round. Needless to say, every round was filled with lots of excitement and adrenalin as the boys chased each-others' high scores.

Over the three rounds, the four classes jointly collected 465 points. Between the Grade 5 classes, 5LM collected the most points (118) with 5JB following in a close second place (115). Grade 4MG had the most Bingo strikes across the three rounds. Each boy received a small prize and watched music videos from famous children's movies to celebrate their efforts.
