Message from the Deputy Headmaster

For obvious reasons, I have thought back to the Australian cricket side, dealing with personal trauma after a devastating accident rocked the cricket world. On 25 November 2014, Phil Hughes was struck by a bouncer on the neck, during a first class game in Sydney. The incident caused a vertebral artery dissection and led to a subarachnoid haemorrhage. Hughes underwent surgery, and was placed into an induced coma. Sadly, he never regained consciousness, and died on 27 November.

The left handed opening batsman, made his Test debut in 2009 at the age of 20. He scored his first Test century in March 2009, in his second Test match for Australia. In the second innings of the same match he scored 160, becoming the youngest cricketer in history to score centuries in both innings of a Test match.

In the wake of the incident, his friends struggled to deal with trauma and shock of the sudden event. Obviously, much closer to home, we have had to deal with a different kind of shock over the last two weeks too. This was the statement released by the school:

Rugby Injury Incident - September 2021

"On Monday last week shock waves rippled through the Graeme College family as they were rocked by devastating and unimaginable news.

During a rugby match on Saturday 5 September, a 1st XV player had developed very serious complications as a result of a rugby injury. In a courageous attempt to prevent a try by the opposition, the player had dislocated his knee. The dislocated joint popped back into place but the player was still obviously in significant pain. He was taken to Greenacres Hospital in Gqeberha that day, where x-rays were taken. He was discharged after no fractures were revealed on the x-rays.

It later came to light that, although there was no fracture, there was significant damage to the main artery during the dislocation. This damage had gone undetected upon his first visit to the hospital. On Monday he was rushed back to the hospital, where it was discovered that damage to muscle tissue in his leg was evident. Sadly, the medical staff advised the family of the agonising news that amputation was the only solution.

Upon hearing this news on Tuesday morning, the Graeme College staff were in absolute shock. A number of staff accompanied the family back to Gqeberha on Tuesday morning, thereafter meeting with the 1st XV squad after school, to discuss the details of what had transpired.

A week after the injury, with the family firmly holding onto every ounce of hope, the player underwent the operation (amputation) this past Sunday.

No words of comfort seem enough but our thoughts and prayers are with him and his family, as he recovers from the emotional and physical trauma of this life-changing situation. In support of their team mate, our 1st XV opted not to play the scheduled match against Pearson High School on Saturday."

When discussing the details of the event with our 1st XV rugby side, the intensity of the situation was overwhelming. These young men were immensely affected by the news, and there were obvious similarities with the Australian team working through the even dramatic news about Phil Hughes. It feels impossible right now, but we need to somehow get to the space where we are thankful that the news wasn't even worse. We look forward to welcoming Simnikiwe back, after his recovery. He has always been a massively influential leader at Graeme College, and on his return, he will continue to be an incredible role model. Our thoughts and prayers are obviously with the Bosman family, as they start the recovery process. People can easily underestimate the bonds that are created between the brothers of a sports team. These young men are all hurting; the empathy that they have shown is incredibly powerful. It is another reminder of how special this school is, but is also a reminder of how much education occurs within an extra-mural environment. You could argue that you learn far more (about life, people, society and relationships) in a boarding house, sports field or arts group, than you could ever in a classroom.

Phil Hughes was on 63 not out, when the horrible accident occured; and the score in so many ways has been a moment on honouring and remembering the star. In a similar way, the Graeme College 1st XV number 12 jersey, will hold a special aura in the future.

A special thanks goes to Richard Gowar for his time and effort preparing the debaters and assisting them during the competition.




Grade 9s

It's all about current, voltage and resistance!

Mr Xoki, our Natural Science student teacher visiting from Rhodes University, assisted the Grade 9s as they embarked on a journey of applying the theory related to electrical circuits to practical examples in the laboratory this week.

Wet cell batteries were constructed using galvinized nails, copper wire and vinegar. The current produced was strong enough to make a buzzer sound. Multi-meters were used to determine the conductivity levels of various everyday objects. They also created electromagnets, made of wire wrapped tightly around a nail and connected to a battery, which picked up several pins at a time. The boys thoroughly enjoyed their practical.






All entries will be adjudicated by objective adjudicators from the broader Makhanda community who are experts in the respective entry categories. The adjudicators will provide each participant with comments and achievement certificates in bronze, silver, gold and double gold categories.

To summarise, 52 playing cards plus a joker are shuffled and pinned face down on a board. Each week or fortnight, a raffle is held where supporters pay for the opportunity to possibly be the lucky winner who selects a single card from the board. The objective is to select the joker from the playing cards that are pinned faced down, and thereby win the grand prize. Part of the excitement and fun of Joker Poker is that after each unsuccessful card selection the prize jackpots and technically the odds improve with each draw as well.
