Message from the Headmaster

I recently came across a story about personal expression and an insight into daily life on a meditation website. I thought the story would be appropriate to share at this time of year when we are all gearing up for the end-of-year activities.

"There was once a pair of acrobats. The teacher was a poor widower and the student was a young girl by the name of Meda. These acrobats performed each day on the streets in order to earn enough to eat. Their act consisted of the teacher balancing a tall bamboo pole on his head while the little girl climbed slowly to the top. Once on the top, she remained there while the teacher walked along the ground. Both performers had to maintain complete focus and balance in order to prevent any injury from occurring and to complete the performance. One day, the teacher said to the pupil:'Listen Meda, I will watch you and you watch me, so that we can help each other maintain concentration and balance and prevent an accident. Then we'll surely earn enough to eat.'

But the little girl was wise, she answered, 'Dear master, I think it would be better for each of us to watch ourself. To look after oneself means to look after both of us. That way I am sure we will avoid any accidents and earn enough to eat.' The author explains that this story is meant to illustrate, that taking care of yourself is the most important thing you can

do is to take care of others. By learning how to nourish your mind and body you'll naturally begin to treat those around you with more compassion, love, and kindness and create a more positive impact on the world around you as a whole. There is no division, taking care of yourself (in a spiritual sense, not in a material "buy myself things" kind of sense) equals taking care of others.

Specifically, by taking care of yourself, you take care of others, by showing them compassion and loving kindness. At this time of year, especially for parents/guardians of matric learners, we tend to get more and more stressed because we have our focus on our own situations.

The above story illustrates that one can change one's energy and stress, by changing one's perspective. By shifting our day-to-day focus away from stress and, instead, directing it toward how one can help family and friends will achieve what's meaningful to them.


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Scifest

With practical exams around the corner, our subject music students are working hard to get their work performance ready. A practical music exam consists of four sections: (1) technical work, (2) two performance pieces, (3) sight-reading and (4) aural tests.

Technical work consists of scales and a 'Study' that show the student's technical agility and his ability to control expression and articulation in his performance. A 'Study' is a musical piece that mainly consists of a combination of the required technical exercises and scales.

Performance pieces take up most of the time in an exam. In fact, it is similar to playing in a concert: students had to work consistenly throughout the year in order to fluently and confidently showcase all aspects of musicianship required for the interpretation of the pieces. For sight-reading, students are given a short piece of music that they have never seen before. They have two minutes to study it, after which they have to play it accurately. Aural tests require students to listen to various musical phrases and to answer questions relating to pitch, rhythm and tonality.

We wish all our subject students a productive week ahead! Remember, the more you practise, the easier (and better!) it gets! Pictured below are ours boys practicing hard this week.

Well done to all the boys who participated for their country. It was such fun and we are very sad it has come to an end.

















The Grade 5JB boys won the coin-it challenge and their reward was a trip to the beach. The boys went on Wednesday and loved every minute of it!








• Senior Cricket

Each week or fortnight, a raffle is held where supporters pay for the opportunity to possibly be the lucky winner who selects a single card from the board. The objective is to select the joker from the playing cards that are pinned faced down, and thereby win the grand prize. 














School Magazine
