Message from the Deputy Headmaster

One of the most significant things about Graeme College, which separates it from many schools, is something I recognised long before teaching here. 

The Grade 4 boys participated in a life skills lesson, where they listened to a speech given by a local snake handler, Dr Chad Keates. The boys were taught about the dangers of snakes and also safety tips of the snakes that live around the area of Grahamstown as well as the importance of frogs and snakes and the role that they play in our environment. Dr Keates, spoke on behalf of the Wetland Ecology Lab (WEL) and SAIAB. He is currently a researcher at Rhodes University, doing molecular systematics and ecology on African herpetofauna.



Grade 11s

"Water pollution is a global ,but nevertheless, a local issue. Think about the next generation. Get involved and help!" This week the Grade 11 boys enjoyed a visit by distinguished local biotechnologist, Ms Thandiswa Nqowana, who is currently doing her PhD. Her work revolves around the topic of water quality. She has been instrumental in coordinating a successful programme in the public schooling system in Makhanda using Hydrogen Sulphide water testing kits. Ms Nqowana took time out of her busy research and community engagement schedule, to speak to the Grade 11 boys about water quality. The grade 11's engaged positively with Ms Nqowanaon on the topic and had several questions. One particular grade 11 found Ms Nqowana extremely informative about water and the dangers it comes with and he commented "What stood out to me the most was her plan to provide a cheap accessible way to identify and try to clean contaminated water." Steven Pittaway is the Head of the Environmental Portfolio, and he did a fitting thank you to Ms Nqowana.

• Junior Cricket

The junior school showed more sublime form this weekend, with the u13A getting two wins over Selborne Primary. On Friday afternoon, the two sides faced off in arguably the most exciting format of the game, 20 overs. Graeme won the toss and decided to bat first. The opening batsmen started of exceptionally well scoring well over a run a ball. Enrique Strydom and Rhys Wiblin had an 87 run opening partnership which set the platform for the rest of the innings, before Styrdom was bowled for 29 Wiblin did not let this halt his momentum as he scored a well-deserved 70 runs off 60 balls to lead his side to 151 for 5. The Selborne batsmen found it very difficult to stay ahead of the run rate due to some exceptional bowling from Graeme. The spinners led the charge as they took 7 wickets between them. Rhys Wiblin (2/20) and Enrique Strydom (2/28), were well supported by Zuko Pontshi (2/6) and Keagan Jattiem (1/30), as they restricted Selborne to 106 for 8 in their 20 overs. Graeme won by 45 runs.

Saturday brought about a new set of challenges for both sides, as the cold windy weather crept in. Selborne won the toss and decided to bat first. They found it difficult to score runs against an exceptional Graeme College bowling unit. Andrew Muir was superb as he only conceded 3 runs in his opening spell of 4 overs. Erin Stevens, along with Rhys Wiblin, sustained this pressure as 7 wickets fell during their spells. Stevens ended the day with remarkable figures of 3/7 in 7.2 overs and Wiblin 2/20 in his 8 overs. The Graeme side applied constant pressure with good fielding, which led to two run outs. Selborne struggled to score runs and were 86 all out. The Graeme batsmen batted with intent as they quickly chased down the score in 14 overs. Rhys Wiblin continuing his run of form as he scored 41 not out. Graeme College won by 8 wickets.

The u11A side was just as outstanding with their incredible performances against Sunridge. James Muir scored 105 not out, and Connor Holder another half century.
