Message from the Deputy Headmaster

Other than the 'Don't smile till Easter' cliche - the most famous phrase in education is probably: "Take care of the little things, and the big things will take care of themselves." Of all the cliches attached to teaching - the 'look after the little things' has proven to last the test of time. Those, who are actively involved in education, will know exactly what this means, and it is even more prevalent to management within schools (or any organization). It is the Broken Windows Theory - don't leave the small things. By 'fixing them' we create a culture that changes the behavior of individuals within that environment. In its simplest form - if there is a broken window - fix it - dont leave it. If you start 'leaving it', you will eventually end up letting the slightly bigger more serious matters slide as well. The theory was popularized in the 1990s by New York City police commissioner and mayor, whose policing policies were influenced by the theory.

The theory suggests that if a window in a building is broken and is left unrepaired, all the rest of the windows will soon be broken. This is as true in nice neighbourhoods as in rundown ones. In education, nothing could be more accurate - with regards to both maintenance and discipline. In the educational context, we look at the small disciplinary issues punctuality, homework, neatness, shaving, hair styles, etc. Probably the smallest one of all - buttons on blazers. These days - wearing masks appropriately seems to make the list. Without any doubt at all - this leads to the bigger issues in schools somehow falling into place.

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There is a direct result - which, not everybody, will understand or appreciate. In the midst of the 'hair style' crisis in South Africa, I read a comment that said 'a hairstyle has zero impact on a child's learning' - and in its raw simplicity, that is probably accurate. BUT - being in uniform has a direct impact on classroom discipline - and hair uniformity definitely falls in that space as well. You just have to teach lessons during a 'civvies day' to understand the difference.

Likewise, the New York example, had a massive focus on graffiti, litter, petty crimes which over years seemed to have some further significant impact on larger crimes. The statistics showed a drop in murder rates - which is a contentious conclusion to deduce, I know. Obviously murder and graffiti are two vastly different crimes. But they are part of the same continuum, and a climate that tolerates one is more likely to tolerate the other. So in schools, by being pedantic about the minor infringements - we definitely see a reduced number of serious disciplinary issues.

It is important then that our parents (especially) support us in this notion. Without parental support, and their own understanding of these smaller issues, the school will always struggle to maintain a good level of discipline. Hopefully, every parent agrees that the personal discipline of each learner, will help them to develop into mature and responsible adults. That is a massive part of any educational process at any school. It is not just about the content covered in classes, but also the development of individuals to become positive and productive members of society. The discipline at an allboys school is critical in the development of each learner.


