Message from the Deputy Headmaster

On Wednesday evening, we were so privileged to enjoy the performance of our internal eisteddfod at the music centre. Sometimes it's hard to accurately explain the 'feel good' sensation after these types of events. I liken it to taking a landscape photo of stunning scenery. The photo is often great, but it never quite shows the magnitude of standing in front of that view accurately enough - you lack depth, colour and sensation. Likewise, I think you have to be sitting in the auditorium, to fully appreciate the incredible talent, comradery and sense of occasion during events like the eisteddfod.

We had performances from Grade 3 to Grade 12, covering a variety of arts. Prepared speeches, readings as well as a wide range of musical items. When a Grade 4 stands up and delivers a brilliant vocal rendition of 'When I was your man' (Bruno Mars), you are just blown away. Never mind the wonderful talent - the sheer courage of doing that, in front of a big audience, is something that leaves you in awe. Some Grade 12s took a small break from their exam preparation and displayed their talents as well. The parents, learners and staff were treated to some absolutely stunning performances. I loved watching the thrill on their faces, as they completed their performances, but also the admiration and respect from their peers in recognition of their talent was also profound. To watch and listen to our youngest learners play incredibly complicated piano solos and duets, is so very impressive.

Right at the end of the evening, Ms Niesing introduced Iviwe Mshubeki (Grade 10) who had entered the eisteddfod and was performing a piano solo. He walked up towards the piano, with the physique of a strapping rugby forward, with blazer buttons under pressure with regards to his strong, burly physique. To then sit down and perform a piano performance of that calibre with such grace, was again, just sensational. Iviwe is well known for his sporting achievements on the cricket and rugby fields, but also has a love for music. Although not a music student at Graeme, he spends a lot of time in the music department to hone his talents. It's just a reminder of how special our school is, but also just exciting to see our learners following their passions.

The music room was packed as everybody enjoyed the evening, and I know there are plans (dreams) about a new arts venue... Watch this space.

At a similar time, one-hundred metres away, the Maths department hosted the inaugural Mathematics Triangular between Graeme, VG and PJ. That is also a stunning initiative, which was amazing to see come together. The learners loved the challenge and the experience. That was a few hours after the entire Senior School wrote a Maths Olympiad in the last lesson.








Grade Rs






Grade 7 camp

The annual Grade 7 camp started this week at the Steve Biko Centre eQonce. Here the boys were given a fascinating presentation and watched an excellent documentary on the life of this stalwart of the antiapartheid struggle. They then walked to the Biko family home which is now a national monument.

They then drove to the friendly and efficient Yellowsands Campsite outside East London. The boys pitched their tents, participated in a variety of group activities and tucked into a tasty braai before settling in for the night. The challenge was ensuring that tents remained upright in the strong wind. The boys also participated in a sandcastle-building competition on the beach at the Kwelera Beach. The theme was 'The Olympic Games'. Then the boys did a beach hike to Glengariff. The boys did a study of the ecology of rock pools, including sightings of an octopus and starfish. They also saw the endangered African Oystercatcher. Further down the beach they came across the (very smelly) carcass of a Southern-Right Whale which was very interesting, before heading home for lunch.

















Grade 9s

Grade 9 Forces Practical

The Grade 9s have been discovering the effects of forces this term. We do not see these forces but we do see their effects. We can see the effect of pushing and pulling forces -which result in objects moving. We also see the effects of field/non-contact forces. Magnets can be used to separate iron filings from sand, a magnet can be used to create a compass with a sewing needle and a cork. By rubbing a balloon on our jersey we can create an electrostatic force which then causes our hair to be attracted to the balloon.



















Grade 10s

The grade 10 life science classes were invited and warmly welcomed to the Albany museum this week to learn more about the history of life on Earth. South Africa, and the Eastern Cape in particular, boasts a rich and important fossil record which the boys discovered under the guidance of Dr Prevec at the museum and Mr Nel at the Devonian Centre. We were so lucky to be able to hear these experts describe and explain their areas of speciality and to be able to see (and even handle!) some of these precious fossils. A huge thanks to both for sharing their time, wisdom and enthusiasm with us!













Grade 12s

The Grade 12s were treated to an afternoon workshop with Dr Rose Prevec (from the Albany Museum) on the topic of Human Evolution. The general understanding of Human Evolution is largely based on the fossil record. It was fascinating for us all to examine several exact replicas of the original fossilised skulls which have been used to unpack the complex development of modern humans. These replicas included the famous Mrs Ples, who is much smaller than we expected and in fact, might be Mr Ples. A big thank you to Dr Prevec for spending the afternoon with us and making this complex topic much easier to understand.







Iviwe Mshubeki in Gr 10 became a regular in the music practice rooms this year. He felt a drive to play piano and started to learn pieces he liked from Youtube. We heard him practise and try out songs and offered to give him guidance on appropriate technique and other aspects of musicianship. Every time he has made good progress after practising, he'd pop in at the teaching rooms for advice and a little bit of coaching - and then he heads back to practise with excitement.

His consistent and dedicated approach led to him having a good repertoire, which he decided to enter for our Eisteddfod. He played Lovely (Billie Eilish), Interstellar (Hanz Zimmer) and Solas (Jamie Duffy), receiving a Gold grading for his rendition of Solas and Silver gradings for Lovely and Interstellar. This is outstanding for someone who only started to play piano this year. We believe that this sets a wonderful example to the other music pupils about success in music study:

- (1) take ownership of your pieces by practising and internalising them so that contact time with teachers are optimised for those more sophisticated aspects related to a well-rounded result (lessons aren't for practising with a teacher),
- (2) be consistent, and
- (3) enjoy the process of crafting beautiful music.

Two grade 4 piano pupils are a concrete example of how Iviwe's dedication has inspired others. Zukhanyo and Bilaal (also pianists and regulars in the practice rooms) saw Iviwe practiise Interstellar and they instantly became fans. They asked Iviwe about the piece and he offered to teach them the theme of Interstellar - which they can now play! At the time they did not know Iviwe's name, so he became known amongst them as 'Piano Friend'. How special it is to witness the kindness, camaraderie and shared joy of our pupils.




Athletics





We are delighted to announce that Graeme College has purchased a full membership of the VIVE TEEN WELLNESS application, which will enable ALL our learners to have full access to the app. It is something that we have thoroughly investigated, and feel that this is a massive step in the right direction for the wellbeing of our all learners. We are excited that every learner will have safe space to learn more about mental wellness, and reach out for help if needed, in a number of ways.

VIVE TEEN WELLNESS is an Artificial Intelligence enabled digital platform and smartphone application that was built in South Africa. The first version was launched earlier in 2023, with several schools presently using the full suite of functionality. The schools and learners that have been using the platform in recent months have provided us with very valuable feedback that assisted us in planning the next phase of the roll-out. During 2022 VIVE TEENS has been selected as a winner in the UpLink - World Economic Forum (WEF) Youth Mental Health Challenge where it has competed with over 120 other mental health companies from across the

globe. The platform is expected to launch internationally early in 2024, and as part of that process we are awarding

South African schools the opportunity to gain from a locally built application and support the mental wellness

of our children. The Graeme College subscription starts from 1 September 2023, but we would like our learners to download the application in the meantime, and familiarise themselves with it by referring to the various videos and guides.
