Message from the Deputy Headmaster

I was sent an interesting story about a small football club in Italy this week. For those who don't know anything about them, fair enough neither did I, which made the story even more interesting. Como 1907 is a small club in northern Italy, better known for its scenery than its football. The starting point would be the type of individuals now running the club. In 2021, former Chelsea player Dennis Wise was appointed CEO of the club. In August 2022, former Arsenal and Barcelona player, Cesc Fàbregas arrived as a minority stakeholder, while also playing for the club as a player. He later took charge as the manager of the team. Another minority stakeholder is a French football legend, Thierry Henry.

Consecutive relegations in 2000s caused financial difficulties to Como. In 2004, the club was declared bankrupt and excluded from participation in Italian professional football. They were immediately admitted to Serie D, the top level of non-professional football in Italy, where they spent three seasons before earning promotion back to Serie C2 in 2007. After a further bankruptcy in 2016, a new company re-founded the club in 2017 and was admitted to Serie D. Their fortunes changed when powerful investors changed the profile of the club. It's amazing when you combine the tradition and history with the right people. They have since been promoted to the top level in Italy, even though their stadium is one of the smallest in Italy. In fact, intense conversations have been had, because their stadium didn't meet the minimum criteria for Serie A home matches. And yet, they now compete against the giants in Italian football.

It's an incredible story, which I encourage you to have a look into if that type of story interests you. You would also pick up so many similarities between their story and ours, and that's why the story was sent to me, along

with the heading: "Small club joins top tier". Obviously alluding to our space at Graeme College. For a small school, the heights we are achieving at the moment is absolutely amazing. It's just a reminder about what can be achieved if you get the right people involved - in our case: staff, parents, community and learners. With that special combination, we can create our own Como 1907 story. In many ways we have already created that and will continue to do so. Watching our cricketers compete at Cape Schools' Cricket Festival, or seeing the three players selected into the u16 Elite Rugby Camp... or just the impressive results throughout an exceptional rugby season. Graeme continues to punch above our weight category in every sphere.

With somewhat limited resources and a close-knit community, our learners train relentlessly, fueled by a shared passion. We always earn respect from opponents and prove that skill and determination can triumph over sheer size. Each of these occasions becomes a testament to our spirit, showcasing how a small school can make a big impact on the field and in the hearts of their supporters.

Message from Junior School HOD

School holidays are just around the corner, however we please ask that our children keep reading! Encouraging children to read during the holidays can help them return to school refreshed and ready to tackle new challenges, while also enjoying the many benefits of reading.



As a parent, are you aware of the phenomenon called the 'Summer Slide'?

If not, it is critical that you take note, educate yourself and read through to the end of this message.

The 'Summer Slide' refers to the loss of academic skills that occurs when children are on holiday and which is attributed largely to the lack of reading. Children and teens who don't read much over the long December holidays can lose gains they've made in their reading levels and fluency over the year. When children are involved in holiday reading, the loss in academic development, including their reading ability, is less.

One researcher compares reading to excercise. She encourages students to read in an effort to strengthen their reading skills. Just like exercising keeps muscles in shape, reading keeps the brain in shape. If you don't exercise, you lose muscle, and if you don't read, you will lose literacy skills.

Extensive research has shown that children regress (go backwards) by 3 months in their reading ability if they do not read during the holiday. Graemians are also under greater pressure than many learners around the world as they have to write their Grade 12 exams in a second or third-language, which is English. Put simply, the evidence is clear. YOUR LEOPARD MUST READ DURING THE HOLIDAYS (and some of that reading should be in English)!

If your Leopard loves reading, your problem is solved – just keep on encouraging him and make sure that he has enough enjoyable books to read during the holidays.

If your Leopard does not enjoy reading, or refuses to read, then you have a problem and you have a CRITICAL role to play as a parent. You will need to insist that he reads and you will need to read with him.

Here is a list of helpful hints to ensure that he reads:

- Minimum of 10 minutes per day, 4 days per week
- Use of a mix of reading out loud and reading in silence
- Find reading material that he enjoys reading (eg a soccer magazine, an age-appropriate action book etc)
- Go to the Makhanda Public Library (45 Hill Street) to select books together there is no charge to take out books
- · Buy books for him as a Christmas present
- Swap books with other Graeme families (share information with each other about which books your boys have enjoyed reading)
- Introduce a rule at home of 'No reading, no screens'. In other words, he may only use screens (cell phone, TV, tablet etc) once he has done his reading for the day. Or 'No reading, no games' – he may only go outside and play with his friends once he has done his reading
- Reward him with treats (eg pocket money) once he has done his reading for the week properly
- Participate in the reading process with him. This will greatly encourage him. Read to him, as well as getting him to read to you








Grade 9s

AJ Jeggels spun a web around the Woodridge College batsmen, while Andrew Muir scored his second halfcentury in two days, as Graeme College romped to a six-wicket victory over their opponents on the Somerset Field at Graeme College on Saturday.

When they batted. Graeme College faced a low target of 96 runs in 50 overs after their bowlers had run through the

Woodridge batting line-up, bowling them out for a paltry 95 in 25.4 overs. The hosts replied with 97/4 in 17.4 overs.

Graeme College made good use of the conditions after they won the toss and elected to field first. Ethan Bokbaard, who made his first XI debut this season, took the new ball and proved to be almost unplayable. The grade 11 seamer accounted for three of Woodridge's top four batsmen for single figures within the first 10 overs of the match.

He dismissed Jayden Damons (8), Lukhanyo Ndulama (0), and Randy Syce (5) before they posed a threat. In his six overs, he captured 3/26. With the top order neutralised, it was time for Jeggels to work his magic. The off-spinner expertly dismantled Woodridge's middle order and finished the match with the brilliant figures of 4/22 from seven overs.

Ethan Moothoo offered some resistance, but not even he could withstand the pressure from Graeme College, and he was dismissed after scoring a laboured 17 off 46 balls. Oliver Puttergill (13) and Daniel Darlow (12) were the only other Woodridge players to reach double figures.

Had Graeme College's bowlers been more disciplined, they would have bundled out Woodridge for a score closer to 65. However, they conceded 30 extras, with Jason Damons and Muir the chief culprits. They contributed a combined 21 extras between them, 12 of them from Damons, while Muir

Muir made amends by creaming eight fours and two sixes on his way to an unbeaten 55 off 51 deliveries to secure victory for his side. A measure of the quality of the grade 10 player's innings was the fact that he tallied only one four less than the entire Woodridge batting line-up combined, and he struck more sixes than the visitors, too.

Muir headed into the match on the back of a blistering unbeaten and match-winning half-century for Graeme in a Schools SA20 match on Friday. He transferred those run-scoring abilities to the 50-over game by taking control of a chase that appeared to be stalling.

The hosts were two wickets down, with three runs on the board, after 1.4 overs, when Muir arrived at the crease. Not too long after that, Graeme College was drowning on 13/3. Things stabilised, thanks to a 28-run partnership between Muir and Luphelo Mdyesha. From there, Muir took control of the match as he batted his side to victory, with Athandile Feni (9") for company in the middle.

During their innings, Woodridge's batsmen were never able to get comfortable. The score crept along at a snail's pace, advancing at only 3.7 runs an over. In their run chase, Graeme College sailed along at 5.47 runs per over, which looked rather handsome compared to their opponent's run rate.

The victory is a good confidence booster for coach Odwa Xonxa's side, which heads for the Cape Schools Festival next week where they will have to be at their best as one of their first matches will be against Wynberg Boys' High.

The coach feels his team is in a better position to compete this season, given that they have enjoyed good preparations, which included six weeks of net sessions. That's something they didn't have in previous seasons.

They also produced solid showings at the Pearson Festival where they won four out of four contests. Zuko Pontshi scored a brilliant century in one of those matches, while Corbin Tidbury, an u16 player, chalked up a couple of half-centuries.

"One of our goals for the season is to get some of our boys into the provincial side," Xonxa shared. With the start his side has made to the season, that looks quite possible.





Teen App



We are excited that every learner will have safe space to learn more about mental wellness, and reach out for help if needed, in a number of ways.

VIVE TEEN WELLNESS is an Artificial Intelligence enabled digital platform and smartphone application that was built in South Africa. The first version was launched earlier in 2023, with several schools presently using the full suite of functionality. The schools and learners that have been using the platform in recent months have provided us with very valuable feedback that assisted us in planning the next phase of the roll-out. During 2022 VIVE TEENS has been selected as a winner in the UpLink - World Economic Forum (WEF) Youth Mental Health Challenge where it has competed with over 120 other mental health companies from across the globe.

The platform is expected to launch internationally early in 2024, and as part of that process we are awarding South African schools the opportunity to gain from a locally built application and support the mental wellness of our children.
