We had the most stunning speech by Mr Alan Campbell in the Founders' assembly on Friday morning. He even brought his SUITCASE of memories! Mr Campbell returned for his 50th school reunion this weekend and we were so privileged to have him speak.

We thought we would share his speech with you.

### "FIFTY YEARS

- Mr Watson, Members of Staff, Mr Izak Smuts, Chairman of the Old Graemian Union, Mr Neil Smuts, the most famous Old Graemian supporter, Ladies and Gentleman and the most important people here today, the Sons of the Leopard.
- It is a great privilege and honour being asked to say a few words on behalf of the Class of 1975 as Graeme celebrates 50 years at the new school. We were the first matrics at the new school and we also celebrate 50 years since we left school. We also congratulate the Old Graemian Union on its Centenary of 100 proud years. It is also 50 years ago that Graeme first accepted Grade 1, 2 and 3 learners into the school. We as a Graemian family have much to celebrate.
- I wish to share a story with you.
- One day a little girl was sitting and watching her mother wash the dishes. She suddenly noticed that her mother had several strands of white hair sticking out in contrast to her brunette hair.
- She looked at her mother and inquisitively asked, Why are some of your hairs white, Mom. Her mother replied, "Well every time that you do something wrong, make me upset or unhappy, one of my hairs turn white"
- The little girl thought for awhile and then said, Mommy how come grandma's hairs are all white.
- When Mr Neil Smuts asked me to say a few words today I immediately accepted, but I then wondered what should I speak to you about.
- Nelson Mandela made the statement: "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the World", He also said that Education is the great engine of personal development. It is through Education that the daughter of a peasant can become a doctor, that the son of a mine worker can become the manager of the mine and that the child of a farm worker can become a president of a great nation.
- Powerful words which I believe that Graeme College has achieved.
- I want to ask you the following question.
- What do you think school was like 50 years ago?
- I must mention there were no computers like you have today.
- There were no cell phones, wifi or the world wide web to do a google search for information.

We used books called encyclopaedias. Cell phones came on the market in South Africa in 1996. (That is 21 years after we left school) There was also no TV in 1975 in South Africa. It was first launched in 1976 and there was only one channel.

- Imagine school today without computers, cell phones, wi-fi and television.
- I thought I would take you back to the first day of school in 1975. We all arrived at the old school for the beginning of the new year to be told without warning that we were moving to the new school. There was a short planning meeting and shortly after that the trucks from Beaumont and Rice arrived and the packing began. Everyone helped, teachers and learners worked together, moving desks, tables, text books, stationary, library books, science laboratory equipment, gymnastic equipment, hostel beds etc to be transported to the new school.
- A group of the 1975 matrics decided to carry their desks across town to the new school, which took most of the day.
- Within three days school commenced at the new school, however there was a lot to sort out. The new school was like a building site as the grounds were not complete. Roads needed to be completed, the swimming pool was green and the main sports field (Somerset Field) had no grass and still needed to be levelled. There were very few trees. Teaching was hampered for the first few weeks with power failures, water failures and book shortages, but one by one the problems were solved. We were at last at the New Graeme campus. Today as we return after 50 years, you have a beautiful campus, one of the best campuses in South Africa with amazing facilities. As learners you must appreciate and look after what

### Pastor's message

We wanted to share the heartfelt message from Pastor Tendai Chitsike, a proud Graemian parent, delivered at Founders' Day yesterday. His words were truly inspiring and a reminder of honour and hope.

"As a parent of a Graemian, a pastor to several Graeme boys in Grant House and a citizen of our town, I count it a great privilege to stand and share this devotion with you all today. In an age where so much emphasis is placed on the self in social media, advertising and the like, perhaps some may ask: why take the time to honour others who have gone before us?

In a 2024 survey in the United Kingdom, among young people aged between 18-24, just 14% said they would be willing to make the sacrifices to serve their nation that these past Graemians made.

Why Honour? Why don't we just get on with achieving personal success, or depending on your preference, take the day off?! So, besides the free drink and donut, why honour? Our Lord Jesus said the following to his disciples in the gospel of John (4:38): Others have done the hard work, and you have reaped the benefits of their labour."

Bearing this in mind, may I suggest at least four reasons why we should honour:

- 1. When we honour, we appreciate and don't take for granted the benefits we currently have. Remember the feeling you have when power comes back on after load-shedding, and be grateful for Thomas Edison and others!
- 2. When we honour, we appreciate the significant sacrifice that others made for us to enjoy today, a sacrifice that occurred in times much more challenging than our own, and often at the cost of their very lives.
- 3. When we honour others, it is good for own soul...it draws us upward and outward, away from seeking honour for ourselves as we recognise that which is honourable in others.
- 4. Lastly, when we honour past generations, we set a good example to future generations to gratefully receive what others have worked for.
- In those that have gone before us at Graeme, we have numerous examples.
- We have those who did the hard work of not only envisaging, but pioneering and building a school from the ground up.
- We have those who did the hard work of paying the price to make our world and our country a better place, even at the cost of their very life in war and trial. So, this is why we honour!

### Pastor's message

But something else happens when we honour those who have gone before us. We are met with the fact that they have passed on, and we too, like them, will pass on. And that reality begs the question: Where then does our ultimate hope lie?....

- To answer this question, we can look across all of human history to one man alone, who answered
- this question not only with his words, but with his life, death and resurrection.
- As our Lord Jesus said to Martha in John 11:25-26: ..."I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; 26 and whoever lives and believes in me will never die.
- Do you believe this?"
- Our Lord Jesus offers this hope to us all, whether you are a young Graemian with the future ahead of you, an 'old Graemian' looking partly in the future and partly in the rear view mirror, or a citizen of our town and nation.
- The hope is this: that whatever the shortcomings or success we experience in this world, come what may, if we as mere mortals turn and put our trust in Him, we have an everlasting hope found in our Lord Jesus Christ.
- So, today as we honour the courage and toil of past generations, may we also anchor our present and future hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, Our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come, and Our eternal home- Amen.
